Value(s) of large-scale genomic initiatives 17th-18th June 2024 Big Data Institute, Oxford

Abstract:

Genomic medicine has the potential to make significant contributions to society such as improving health, and driving science, innovation and the economy. To advance the implementation of genomics into routine clinical care, large national genomic initiatives have been created in many countries, including France, England and Germany, collecting, managing and analysing large scale genomic datasets to realise the genomic project.

While there is much talk about the importance of genomics, there is little in-depth analysis of the actual value of genomics for society at a variety of levels: economic, societal, individual, clinical, and population level. This workshop proposes a structured first overview of the value(s) of large-scale genomic programmes at these levels, bringing together academics, policy-makers, and clinicians from various fields and countries.
